Quebec City 6-10 August 2018 IGU-CAG-NCGE conference

The 2018 International Geographical Union (IGU) – the Canadian Association of Geographers (CAG) – National Council for Geographic Education (NCGE) conference will be held in Quebec City from August 6 to 10 2018. The theme of the conference is 'Appreciating Difference / Apprécier la différence.' 
IGU Thematic Conference ‘Practical Geography and XXI Century Challenges’, Moscow Russia, 4-6 June 2018

IGU Thematic Conference ‘Practical Geography and XXI Century Challenges’ will be held in Moscow on 4-6 June 2018. This occasion provides an opportunity to make an overview of international and domestic trends in the development of geography under the growing impact of internationalization and the aggravation of global problems and to strengthen integration between social and environmental geographical disciplines. The Conference program includes 8 themes covering the major challenges to geography in XXI century. Especially the theme of “Challenges to geographical education” will focus on the issues such as ‘Geographical knowledge and competencies required by graduates of the XXI century’; ‘New programs and textbooks’; ‘Geographical knowledge and competencies required by graduates of the XXI century’

International Research in Geographical and Environmental Education (IRGEE) Update

IRGEE is seeking abstracts for the following special issue. Please note the modified due dates.



“Bringing the world into the Geography Classroom”

How might we leverage industry experts into our classrooms?
How can students interact with real-life geographers or scientists who could explain concepts, describe the day-to-day operations of their jobs, and even co-assess student work?

The advantages of bringing the world into the geography classroom may be three-fold: 1) classrooms can be supplemented with human capital assets beyond the teaching force; 2) experts could provide meaningful content on real-world applications of abstract concepts, and 3) students could expand their networks by meeting and getting to know—perhaps for the first time—professionals working in geographical and scientific areas.

IRGEE is seeking to publish a special edition of 8 to 10 papers from both experienced and inexperienced authors. Papers will show an awareness of international perspectives, but be firmly housed in a specific geographic region. Papers need to be of interest to an international audience. This special issue aims to bring together work by researchers from different countries reporting high quality research on the theme “Bringing the world back into the Geography Classroom” which has international relevance.

This is an open call to submit a proposal (either theoretical or empirical) consisting of a 500 word extended abstract. The following should be clearly outlined within the abstract:

1. Proposed title of the paper and author/s name, affiliation/s and email address/s
2. Perspective/theoretical framework
3. Methods/techniques/modes of inquiry
4. Data sources/evidence/materials
5. Results and/or substantiated conclusions
6. Scholarly significance of the study

Please send your extended abstract proposal to the Special Issue Editors Gillian Kidman, A/Professor of Science Education at Monash University, Australia at: Gillian.kidman@monash.edu by **December 31st, 2017**. Submissions will be considered by the Special Issue Editors, and authors will be informed of decisions about the suitability of the paper for this issue, by **January 18th, 2017**. Full papers will be due by the **May 1st, 2018** to be published in 2019 in Volume 28, Issue 1.

Trends in International Geography Assessment Study (TIGAS)

The TIGAS study group met recently for working sessions in Brugg, Switzerland (September 2017) and Lisbon, Portugal (October 2017). The Switzerland meeting produced a draft framework for the international geography assessment. In Lisbon, the study group hosted a “social lab” to obtain critical feedback on the draft framework. Looking ahead, members of the study group are preparing research proposals to carry the project forward over the next several years. The goal is to introduce the geography assessment in conjunction with the Trends in International Mathematics and Science Study in 2023. Full details are available on the TIGAS website.
