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# 1. Introduction from the Honorary Secretary

We seem to have a 'bumper issue' once again. There does appear to be a lot happening around the world in geographical education. This is very good news. Not that all is easy, as reports in section 13 of this Newsletter indicate with curriculum changes in Ireland and England, which may prove challenging in their different ways. I do urge you to respond to the call from Ireland (see 13.2 below), as we did in the case of geography in schools in Italy recently, to support the argument for retaining geography clearly in the Irish school curriculum.

This issue contains more details of the IGU Conference in Santiago, Chile, in November, at which the CGE will have three Commission sessions. There is still room to attend, so do follow up by looking at the website. There are more details about the IGU Congress in Cologne in August 2012, with its ten geography education sessions, and of the Pre-Congress Symposium at Freiberg just before it. So do please check through section 9 below. In section 10 a wide variety of other conferences relevant to geographical education are included. We have an innovation in this issue, in section 7, with the advert for the appointment of a professor in geographical education and the Directorship of the Gilbert Grosvenor Center at Texas State University - San Marcos. We hear also from colleagues in Japan about the response to the appeal for the schools in the tsumani-hit north-east of the country.

There is news about the next Geography Olympiad, as well as about the publication of the Proceedings of the IGU CGE Regional Symposium in Istanbul in 2010, which can be accessed through the Symposium website. We have also received more information on research activities, new publications, EURGEO and much else that has been included in this Newsletter. As the northern hemisphere moves into its next educational season, may I wish you all a good rest of 2012.

# 2. From the IGU CGE Chair: Professor Lex Chalmers

Kia otra tatou (Greetings to you all),

I trust our northern hemisphere colleagues have had a productive summer, but at least a week or two of restorative time to do the family and recreation things we all need to do. Of course, we've worked though winter in the southern hemisphere (the first few flakes of snow in Hamilton in living memory), and the pressures of the teaching year to the point that we have just six weeks of teaching before the end of the academic (undergraduate) year. There is much to report in this Newsletter, and Simon has done an excellent job in getting us all to collaborate.

Regional Conferences have been a feature of Commission activities. As we look to fine-tune the planning for Santiago, I think back to Lucerne, Taipei, London, Hamilton, Beijing, Tsukuba and Istanbul as places we have met outside IGU 'conventions'. Santiago will be the last regional meeting of the current Commission, so while I'd like to welcome all of you to Santiago, I would also like to thank all the local organising committees for their energy, hospitality and organisational skills. Osvaldo Muniz is doing the job for us in Santiago, and you'll find a report from the conference 'coal face' elsewhere in the Newsletter.

The last Newsletter addressed the issue of forming an IGU Commission on Geographical Education for the period 2012-2016 and called for proposals from interested parties; the proposals were to be lodged with the Honorary Secretary, Simon Catling. The protocol is for a submission to be received by the IGU Executive in their final meeting of the year proceeding the IGU Congress (IGU Congresses are held every four years and the next one is in Kõln in 2012). The Executive will consider (competing) bids and endorse a range of Commissions for formal ratification at the General Assembly at Kõln. The Commission has received a very sound proposal from two colleagues and with minor modification this will go forward in their names with endorsements from existing Steering Commission members. I think it would be useful to publicise the proposal in our next Newsletter after our colleagues are assured of Executive support.

Finally, I am not sure how many people take the time to read the widely-distributed IGU Newsletter, or to visit the re-developed IGU website at <a href="http://www.igu-online.org/">http://www.igu-online.org/</a>. Several things caught my eye in the latest edition: the annual Commission funding has increased from \$600US to \$1000US, and the Commission was formally thanked for our contribution to the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs dialogues on behalf of the IGU. # 3. Proposal for a New IGU CGE Commission 2012-2016

In the last Newsletter I included the request for proposals to be made in preparation for a new Commission on Geographical Education to take up the work of the current Commission during 2012-16. The deadline set was July 31<sup>st</sup>, 2011. I am happy to say that a proposal for a new Commission was forthcoming. There was only one. A full proposal document was received jointly from Professors John Lidstone (Australia) and Joop van der Schee (The Netherlands) and this has

been circulated among the Steering Group of the current Commission for consideration and comment. The feedback received has been positive, with some suggestions for amendments.

The process, as Lex has noted, is that the proposal will be discussed at the meeting of the Commission at the IGU Regional Conference in Chile in November. It will also be brought to the attention of the IGU Executive and feedback sought. Once this process has been completed, the proposers will consider any amendments and put forward their final proposal document. We hope that this will be able to be completed during the rest of this year and that the final proposal can be included in the next Newsletter. It will then be put to the IGU Executive formally at the Congress in Cologne, after which if all is acceptable its members will take up their role and lead the Commission from 2012 to 2016.

# 6. Thanks for your responses to the 'Japan Tsunami After-effect Appeal'

We wish to offer our appreciation for the global response we have received to support our efforts to help the suffering of schools in Japan. There was a 'Japan Tsunami After-effect Appeal for Support' in Newsletter No. 7, April 30th, 2011.

The Association of Japanese Geographers has been carrying out a support project to 'Provide geography teaching materials to suffering schools with Japan's earthquake, tsunami and nuclear

crisis zone since 11th March, 2011', under the auspices of The Geographic Education Society of Japan and Japan Association on Geographic Space. We asked for donations for this project. This campaign was closed at the end of July. We have had many donations from all over the world. We, Japanese Geography educators and teachers, very sincerely appreciate all of our IGU-CGE contacts' and friends' support.

Many students and schools suffered and have been struggling with teaching until now. Over 5 months have passed since that fateful day. The project task force team estimated that over 140 devastated schools needed support for teaching materials, that is around 85 primary, 40 junior high and 20 high schools. The team has received much support for the needs of these schools, and is distributing the donations to the schools. Japanese Geography educators and teachers thank all of you again.

We anticipate that you would wish to know of the geographical information about this crisis in English for your lessons or other usage. This is a job advert for someone in geographical education who might be interested in this senior-level appointment at Texas State University, San Marcos, Texas, U.S.A.

We do not normally provide this information, but this does seem a particularly opportune post.

Dr. Philip W. Suckling, Professor and Chair, Department of Geography Texas State University-San Marcos, writes:

The Department of Geography at Texas State University-San Marcos invites applications for the **Jesse H. Jones Distinguished Chair of Geographic Education** who will also serve as **Director of The Gilbert M. Grosvenor Center for Geographic Education**.

This will be a tenured appointment at the full Professor rank, effective Fall 2012. A PhD in Geography or closely related field is required. Required attributes for the successful candidate include: strong publication record in geographic education; well-versed in educational theories in teaching and research; significant record of successful grant acquisition and management in the field of geographic education; quality graduate teaching record including experience mentoring or working with graduate students preferably at the PhD level; evidence of maintaining an active national and international network of professional geography education collaborators; experience providing leadership in geographic education at the state, national or international level; successful management experience such as direction of a major grant, research center or other administrative activities including oversight of staff. To be eligible for hire, applicant must meet the departmental and university requirements for a tenured professor at Texas State University-San Marcos.

Duties of the successful candidate will include: management and direction of the activities of The Gilbert M. Grosvenor Center for Geographic Education and its staff; graduate-level teaching, including advising and mentoring of graduate students especially for the PhD program in geographic education; publication of scholarly research, to also include working professionally with

graduate students on publications; acquisition and management of external grants with a focus on geographic education; working with university officials to acquire external funds through development activities; interacting with leading geographic educators throughout Texas, the United States and internationally; maintaining strong ties with the National Geographic Society including administration of the endowed Grosvenor Scholars' Program; and participation in department and university activities and service assignments appropriate for a tenured member of the faculty.

The Department of Geography has over 30 full-time faculty members serving BA, BS, MS, Master of Applied Geography, and three PhD programs. Note that the department also co-hosts the Texas Alliance for Geographic Education which is an alliance of K-12 and university educators promoting geographic education throughout the state, supported in part by grants from the National Geographic Society.

Applicants must electronically submit a letter of application, curriculum vitae, and the names of at least three references to: ps33@txstate.edu. Review of applications will begin on October 10, 2011 and continue until the position is filled. # 9.1 IGU Regional Conference, Santiago, Chile, November 2011

A regional IGU Conference is to be held in Santiago, Chile in late 2011.

**Date**: November 14<sup>th</sup>-18<sup>th</sup>, 2011.

Venue: Liberator Bernado O'Higgins Military School, Santiago, Chile.

**Theme**: 'United and Integrated with the World'.

The Commission has accepted the invitation of the Local Organising Committee (LoC) to run a program within the IGU Regional Conference in Santiago, on 14th – 18<sup>th</sup> November 2011. The venue for the Regional Conference is the "Liberator Bernardo O'Higgins" Military School; it is close to hotels, the urban transport network, several local restaurants, stores and services. The Regional Conference provides the Commission with an important opportunity to extend the work of the Commission to the Spanish-speaking community, and to build interest in the Commission's activities in Latin America. Osvaldo Muniz is a member of the Commission Steering Group. He has developed the elements of the Commission's program reported below.

<u>Presentation of papers</u>. The call for papers went out with the second circular published earlier in the year. The final date for the submission of papers and abstracts (to be pre-published in the Conference Proceedings) was 30 August, 2011. The papers and abstract submissions will be reviewed by the LoC in the following two weeks, with the Conference Program confirmed on 15 September. Within the program the Commission will have several sessions devoted to papers presented in the Commission's name. Commission members will chair these sessions. At this point more than 30 Commission members have registered for the Conference.

<u>Business meetings</u>. The Commission has applied to have three business sessions within the Regional Conference. Details of these meetings will be provided in the Conference Handbook.

- Fabián Araya-Palacios (Universidad de La Serena, Chile) will chair a meeting entitled the Present Development of Geographical Education in Latin America. The panellists will be João Francisco de Abreu, (Pontificia Universidade Católica de Minas Gerais, Brazil), Iliana Araya-Ramírez, (Universidad Nacional Heredia, Costa Rica) and Josefina Ostuni (Academia Nacional de Geografía Buenos Aires, Argentina).
- Lex Chalmers will chair a virtual meeting entitled Geographical Education Using Digital
  Technology: The use of Virtual Communities of Practice. The panellists will be Osvaldo A.
  Muniz-Solari (Department of Geography, Texas State University, USA), Michael Solem
  (Director of Educational Affairs, Association of American Geographers, USA) and Paul
  Keown/Janey Nolan from (University of Waikato, New Zealand). Steering Committee and
  Corresponding members of the Commission are especially welcome to connect to this
  session digitally; we will advise the time date and connection options for this meeting when
  they are confirmed.
- Regional Conference Welcome to delegates. The Commission will host a meet-and-greet function as an early session at the Conference. At this meeting light refreshments will be served. There will be a presentation on the activities of the Commission and of the prospects for a subsequent 2012-2016 Commission. The Commission will invite attendees to become corresponding members, and seek some regional representatives to promote Commission activities.

<u>Field Trips.</u> The LoC has organized local tours and visits to sites of particular interest. Some of these are included in the cost of conference registration. There are also a number of field trips

planned, and the Commission will inform those registered for the Conference about the trips that will have Commission members in attendance. The possibilities include:

- DISCOVERING THE HISTORY AND HERITAGE OF CENTRAL SANTIAGO. The trip will assess the growth of Santiago visiting some traditional neighbourhoods (One day)
- THE COPIAPÓ VALLEY IN THE ATACAMA DESERT. The trip includes visits to the City of La Serena (500 km to the north of Santiago). An agricultural valley around the city of Copiapo and in the desert of Atacama (805 km to the north of Santiago). (4 days).

Accommodation. On the Regional Conference website, the LoC offers a number of accommodation options. All of these options offer an English-speaking service and range from standard to quality options, generally at less than \$100US a day. For six nights in the Novotel, for example, the Conference rate is \$640US. The Novotel is 10 minutes from the Conference venue. The Commission is also looking at a range of other options including some self-service apartments and cheaper hotels. Dr Fran Martin is the presiding President for the Conference as President of the Geographical Association during 2011-12. She takes up office on September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2011. She writes:

In 2012 the GA's Annual Conference will return to the University of Manchester. The theme for this year's event will be 'Geographies of difference'. Let me explain why I have chosen this theme, and what I hope the conference will enable us to explore.

When I was an impressionable 19 year-old, I travelled to South Africa with my grandparents, spending a week in Cape Town and two weeks in Pretoria. This visit (in 1975) was some time before the apartheid regime was overthrown, and was my first real encounter with injustice. I was shocked by it.

This experience certainly informed my activity as an advisory teacher for primary humanities in the late 1980s. I helped to run courses on values and attitudes. I thought it important to challenge common myths and misconceptions held about minority ethnic groups. I have to say I was shocked by some of the attitudes towards difference that I encountered.

These remain hugely important issues. Danny Dorling, Professor of Human Geography at the University of Sheffield, says that if he had to sum up the current state of the world in one word, 'injustice' would probably do it. Geography is extremely well placed to make a significant contribution to education partly because it helps develop our understanding of difference, diversity – and injustice.

I hope that the 2012 Annual Conference will provide the space to explore the geographies of difference in three key ways:

- By providing a range of examples of how geography education can develop more positive attitudes towards difference in our young people.
- By reflecting on the extent to which geography as a discipline, or community of practice, reflects the diversity of the UK.
- By providing some concrete, positive and inspiring ideas that can be taken back to our places of work and put into practice.

As the most recent Ofsted report for geography in England (2011) makes clear in its title (using the words of the late former GA president Rex Walford), geography has the potential to make 'a world of difference'. I look forward to seeing you all there and working together towards this goal.

# 12. Research Developments Internationally

# 12.1 Place pedagogies and learning landscapes Project

Dr Inger Birkeland writes:

"Place pedagogies and learning landscapes" is a multi-disciplinary and international research project that aims to investigate how place pedagogies can enable better learning in early childhood and primary education. Place pedagogies refer to place-conscious and place-responsive education. Place pedagogies seek to better connect children's learning and development to the places and communities where they live through teaching and learning that directly involves those local places and communities. It is one of many approaches that meet the aims of education for sustainable development (EfSD).

The relevance of place pedagogies is twofold. It facilitates, firstly, better learning by identifying the real and contextual factors and those environments that influence teaching and learning. Secondly, it facilitates more relevant learning by addressing the role of teaching and learning in early childhood and primary education in the age of globalization so that education can have a direct bearing on the health and wellbeing of children and those places where they actually live.

To enable better learning, a context-sensitive approach has been developed based in place-based landscape analysis. Landscapes play a vital role in children's learning and development because they form part of their identity and sense of place. We develop the concept learning landscape to foster theoretical and scientific renewal for education research and greater quality of teaching and learning in education for sustainable development. For us, the learning landscape describes the potential possibilities for local concretization of a national curriculum that takes outset in multimethod mapping of four layers of landscape: the physical, the ecological, the cultural and the social landscapes.

Based in a case study research design, eight cases are developed in different locations in Norway, Finland and Australia in order to explore the learning landscape as an authentic learning environment. Case studies are starting up in collaboration with teachers at selected local schools and kindergartens in 2011 with national funding in the respective countries. The research project will be completed in 2014.

A synthesis of main findings and experiences of the cases will constitute the basis for reflections on global perspectives on EfSD. This will be developed through activities in a global research network for place and sustainability education led by professor Margaret Somerville (Australia).

#### 12.2 GIS in education

In the past decade, more and more geography teachers, teacher trainers, and scientists in the field of geography education have become interested in the possibilities of Geographic Information Systems (GIS) for teaching and learning geography. Tim Favier reports on the results of a PhD study on GIS in secondary geography education. The PhD study aimed to develop a theoretical framework for GIS-supported inquiry-based geography education, and to explore how optimal GIS-supported inquiry-based geography education can be realized in practice. Tim Favier (VU University Amsterdam, The Netherlands; t.t. favier@vu.nl) will defend his dissertation on October 31<sup>st</sup>, 2011. The title of his research report is Geographic Information Systems in inquiry-based secondary geography education.

# 12.4 Making My Place in the World

They are working with 4 schools, 2 in Manchester and 2 in Sheffield, as community geographers for the academic year 2011-12. This is a speaking and listening project working with ten Year 10 (14-15 year old) pupils in each school.

# 13. Curriculum and Teaching Developments

During the past couple of years debates about geography's presence in national curricula have been going on several countries, for instance Italy and Australia. This is also occurring in the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland, two countries where geography has been thought to have a secure place in the curriculum for 5 to 16 year olds over the past twenty years. See sections 10.1 and 10.2 below.

# 13.1 Primary and Secondary National Curriculum developments in England

In England the National Curriculum is under review, with a focus on both determining which subjects should be compulsory in the school curriculum for 5 to 16 year olds, and deciding what the 'content' of the subject curricula should be. At the time of writing it is still not known whether geography will be one of the compulsory subjects, nor for which age ranges. However, the Geographical Association and the Royal Geographical Society with the Institute of British Geographers have been lobbying hard over the past year making the case very strongly for geography. The government's decision to introduce a E-Baccalaureate (E for English) in its 16+ examination, the GCSE, that covers the following subjects has given some hope that geography may be positively considered by the government: English, mathematics, science, physical education, a modern language, and geography or history.

#### Professor David Lambert, Chief Executive of the Geographical Association, UK, writes:

The Geographical Association has responded to the UK government's National Curriculum Review (for England) by launching a **geography curriculum consultation** of its own. This will provide feedback and evidence in order to contribute to the official NCR for geography in 2012. The consultation is a response to the government's intention to reform the National Curriculum to focus on 'core' or 'essential knowledge' of traditional subjects. See what you think.

# 13.2 Geography curriculum in Ireland

Currently in Ireland Geography is part of the core curriculum for almost all students from the start of primary school until the end of the lower secondary programme (ages 4+ to 15 years). It is not compulsory for upper secondary but it is the second most popular optional subject at that level. If current proposals to reform the programme are accepted this is unlikely to be the case. The new Junior Cycle curriculum (lower secondary) will include a compulsory core of Irish, English, Maths and Science only. These will be formally assessed – probably as at present by terminal examinations. Apart from these, schools will be encouraged to develop their own programmes based on 'learning areas', one of which is Social Education, where geography (or aspects of the subject) would be located. Since History and Civic, Social and Political Studies would also be included within Social Education, there are good reasons to suppose that in some schools the choice might be made to adopt a programme in which geography was no longer identified clearly

and where the core aspects of the subject would no longer be clear to students or even presented to them at all. In effect some students would cease to study geography in a meaningful way at the age of 12 years (or at all), when they leave primary school.

The geography community in Ireland is very anxious about this potential damage to the education of students at a time when it is becoming increasingly obvious that Ireland and the world needs concerned, involved, and environmentally educated citizens who have relevant knowledge to draw on and a broad skill set – all of which aspects are developed by the study of geography. A campaign is underway to alert those in authority to the serious effects of this downgrading of the importance of geography. # **C08.11 Geographical Education**

Session: State of the Art in Geography Education

Chair(s): Simon Catling & Alexandra Budke

#### Abstract:

Geography education carries the footprint of its specific national context. \*The International Charter on Geographical Education\* outlines the common core of our subject, but the subject is evolving. There is much change in geography education taking place at national levels around the World at the present time. Alongside the results of the international study of geography education started in 2010, and aiming to map the State of the Art in Geographical Education around the World, papers presenting national initiatives, developments, challenges and achievements are invited. Topics might include: changes to national geography education guidance and curricula; what is the range of geography and what is regarded as most important in a national geography curriculum; ways in which geographical themes, such as the nature-society relationship or the implementation of approaches in new cultural geography, are being incorporated into national geography; the different focuses and contexts of geography curricula for different age groups (pre-school, elementary and secondary) at school and for non-examniation and examination classes; and innovative approaches for teaching geography that are discussed in the different national contexts.

# Session: Students' Interests of Geographical Topics, Regions, and Methods

#### Abstract:

We want to start an international research group about student's interests(topics and regions) in geography and geoscience. Our hypothesis is that there are similarities in student's interests about topics (e.g. natural hazards) but not about regions. # Session: Preconceptions in Geography and Geography Education

### Abstract:

In recent years research about preconceptions and conceptual change regarding geographical concepts and the school subject of geography have gained momentum in geographical education. This trend is of great importance to geographical education because learners' preconceptions about geographical concepts and processes as well as

teachers preconceptions about geography as a school subject are keys and obstacles to geographical learning and teaching. Conceptual change research concerns for example the identification of learners' personal ideas of scientific issues, teachers' ideas regarding the curriculum of geography and epistemological processes while studying geographical issues, strategies of how to change personal ideas, and methodologies that help to make processes of change understandable. In this session high quality research papers that address the issues mentioned above are welcome.

#### Abstract:

This session will offer international perspectives and examples of effective practice in teacher preparation in geography. Papers in this session should address examples of preparing teachers to become effective educators with geospatial technologies, field instruction, inquiry and problem based learning, among other potential topics. We especially welcome papers based on research in geography teacher preparation.

# Session: Innovative Learning - New & Traditional Media

#### Abstract:

Geography is a discipline in which especially visualisation is the starting point of thinking because geography focuses on what the world looks like as a first step in a learning process to understand the world as it is. Various means of representation thereby help us to look at and understand the world around us. According to this several different media play also an important role in geography education. Traditional teaching materials like e.g. textbooks, atlases, stones and models of river systems, are progressively supplemented by new media such as digital maps and movies, GPS and GIS. This session is beyond showing traditional and new media. It focuses on how traditional and new media can help students at all ages to understand the world. Very welcome are research reports that connect the development of geographical knowledge of primary and secondary school students and the use of traditional and/or new media.

The Criteria for Developing Geographical Curricula for Education for Sustainable Development C. # **Session: Spatial Thinking**

#### Abstract:

Spatial thinking, traditionally a subject of interest among cognitive scientists, psychologists, and behavioral geographers, has grown in significance for geography educators with the explosive growth of geospatial technologies and consequent drive to prepare a spatially skilled workforce and citizenry. Defined variously as an amalgam of the knowledge, skills, and habits of mind to use concepts of space, tools of representation, and processes of reasoning to structure problems, find answers, and express solutions to these problems (NRC, 2006), spatial thinking is widely acknowledged as a powerful interdisciplinary tool, useful in mathematics, science, and social science disciplines. It has also been identified as a core component of geographic thinking. We invite papers addressing all aspects of spatial thinking, including, but not limited to, submissions addressing the spatiality of various state and national curricula; theoretical considerations on the interpretation of various elements of spatial thinking, such as concepts of space, in the learning process; ways assessments can and do measure spatial skills and thinking processes; the degree to which textbooks, and other instructional materials support and feature spatial thinking; strategies to teach spatial thinking; the relationship between spatial thinking and geospatial technologies; learning progressions to develop spatial literacy; and individual learner characteristics in relation to spatial thinking

Re: Threat to Junior Certificate Geography in the Core Curriculum

Dear

I understand that the NCCA is due to make its recommendations for Junior Cycle reform and that these recommendations will see Geography removed as a subject from the Core Curriculum at Junior Cycle.

The removal of Geography from the Core Curriculum is a source of extreme concern and one that would be severely detrimental to Irish education in general. It would negatively impact on the education and skill set of young Irish people.

- Geography is the *only* synthesising subject in education in Ireland. It is the only subject which ties together students' learning across the curriculum.
- Geography is the *only* school subject concerned with developing students understanding of the spatial distribution of social, economic, physical and environmental phenomena.
- Geography is the *only* school subject to simultaneously develop student literacy, numeracy, graphicacy and problem solving skills and is therefore vital in improving standards in these skills.
- Most multinational companies and State organisations depend on employees having good geographical skills and knowledge. The attractiveness of the Irish workforce would be diminished by the removal of geography from the Junior Cycle core curriculum.
- The removal of geography from the core curriculum would set Irish education back decades at a time when several countries are re-introducing the subject in their junior curricula.

I urge you to use your influence to help ensure that single-subject geography remains firmly within the core curriculum of the Junior Cycle.
