

International Research in Geographical and Environmental Education (IRGEE) Update



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Help us to make IRGEE even more prestigious!

Please use IRGEE articles in your teaching. Consider your weekly teaching objectives and then search on the IRGEE Journal webpage for articles related to your weekly objectives. We invite you to provide your students with IRGEE journal article references for use in class or in their assessment. To help us increase the IRGEE metrics we kindly ask that you do not provide your students an actual copy of an article – either electronically or hard copy, but give them just the reference, and encourage them to download articles for personal use.

If your students are like mine, they will be reluctant to actually read some articles. I've found that if you use some class time to work with just a small aspect of the article (a graph for example) the students will happily engage with the article. Using research

articles can help your students to achieve learning outcomes that entail complex skills and understandings that can be difficult to teach and are often absent in text books. Research articles, like those in IRGEE, illuminate aspects of teaching and learning that text books ignore like questioning our pedagogies, comparing ideas and hypotheses, and explanations of observations. Engaging students in critical evaluation of primary articles can be a powerful pedagogical strategy to teach thinking skills. When chosen well, an article can also add to the subject matter objectives of your course.

IRGEE has been indexed in Thomson Reuters Emerging Sources Citation Index (ESCI) since 2016. This index includes academic journals of importance in emerging scientific fields and the inclusion of IRGEE in ESCI provides greater discoverability which leads to measurable citations and more transparency in the selection process. This is an

important step towards having IRGEE indexed on other key indices such as the Social Science Citation Index (SSCI), for example. In order to expand the discoverability and outreach of IRGEE on social media space, a Facebook page has been set up since June 2017.

As the flagship journal for the CGE, this is an additional way to raise the impact of IRGEE and the scholarly works of geography educators in an increasingly technologically connected world, through what scholars are recognising as altmetrics. If you visit the journal website, you will notice that each article published will have the number of views, citations and altmetrics listed on the metrics tab. In addition to traditional means of measuring impact, altmetrics tend to have a snowballing effect that will inform readers on the latest articles published in IRGEE. To encourage viewership, articles from current and past issues form IRGEE are featured at the beginning of each week, based on a theme each month. IRGEE has planned a series of themes throughout the year. The topic for Geography and Powerful Knowledge was chosen as Alaric Maude has a newly published article on the debates about powerful knowledge in IRGEE in June and the special issue on climate change education was just published in July. IRGEE's Facebook page also features news from the CGE Facebook page as a way to increase the outreach of the Commission's work. So, please do select and use IRGEE articles in your teaching. Encourage your colleagues and students to download articles of interest, and find out more about articles published in IRGEE through the IRGEE journal webpage and the journal Facebook page. NCRGE awards new grants for transformative research

The National Center for Research in Geography Education (NCRGE), a research consortium headquartered at the American Association of Geographers (AAG) and Texas State University, has approved awards for three new projects under its Transformative Research grant program. NCRGE funds networking activities to strengthen geography education research processes and promote the growth of sustainable, and potentially transformative, lines of research. The latest grants will support the formation of interdisciplinary research groups in the areas of geography pedagogical content knowledge, geospatial technology education, and college-to-career transitions. NCRGE launches the Powerful Geography project

One of the major challenges U.S. schools presently face in providing K-12 geography instruction is the pronounced shortage of teachers with geography backgrounds. Inspired by recent work on GeoCapabilities, the National Center for Research in Geography Education has initiated a new research-based approach to geography teacher education that will expand opportunities for students to experience powerful geographic knowledge in schools. EarthXplorers

The LT Media Lab at the University of Minnesota has released EarthXplorers (https://earthxplorers.com/), a free online learning environment that invites students to tackle geographical challenges centered on sites of historical significance. Two innovative geospatial projects funded by the US National Science Foundation

The following two videos provide interesting background and highlight the research results. The connections between success in science and mathematics and spatial thinking are strong. This is yet another reason to teach geography!

1) Cognitive and Neural Benefits of Teaching Spatial Thinking in the High School Science Classroom

Description: This behavioral and neuroimaging study investigates the effects of spatial education embedded in a science class (Geospatial Semester; GSS) on the core spatial abilities and STEM-relevant spatial thinking of high school students. Preliminary results reveal that compared to students participating in other advanced science courses, students in GSS demonstrated greater improvements in cognitive indicators of spatial ability as well as the increased recruitment of brain regions involved in spatial thinking.

2) Designing Interdisciplinary STEM Curriculum for Impact

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Description: One of the objectives of this study is to empower students in grades 9-12 with the methods and tools needed to address challenges and make meaningful contributions to their communities, while also inspiring their awareness and interest in STEM careers. Students use inquiry and place-based learning to explore topics they recommend, such as crime, community needs, parks & community gardens, and housing.
