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CHAIR'S REPORT

Seasonal greetings from a New Zealand summer.

Sometimes I think that the Southern hemisphere way of organizing workloads is preferable; the end of the year and the longer teaching recess come together, and breaks from work can be celebrated in the height of summer. To those of you who are in the midst of teaching with a short Christmas recess and then a new semester, my commiserations, and the comment that by the time you are reading this your shortest day will have arrived and you, in turn, can look forward to summer.

The Commission on Geographical Education has a big year: the last Newsletter paid tribute to the very successful Symposium in Brisbane and the great work done by John Lidstone and his team. We have a very polished and substantial set of proceedings to lodge in the IGU archives, and the prospect that the Symposium will return a small balance to the Commission. I think our association with the International Network in Learning and teaching Geography at the IGU Regional Conference at Brisbane was also a good move, and that we should look forward to continuing this association in Tunisia.

Most of you will know that the IGU Congress will be held in Tunisia, with the dates of August 25-29 2008. The theme of the Congress is "Collaboratively Building our Territories". One of the key decisions we need to make in the next three months is whether the Commission on holds a pre-Congress Symposium, or whether we participate in the Congress with both paper sessions and business meetings. My personal preference is for a symposium in association with the Congress, but this does not necessarily have to be in Tunisia. We are awaiting a response from the Congress organizers, and I anticipate the Steering Committee will have a clear recommendation

for the next newsletter.

In the interim, the Commission is promoting three regional meetings in 2007, and I encourage those of you who can attend to contact the organizers as soon as possible.

3. PROPOSAL TO EXPAND THE AAG CENTER FOR GLOBAL GEOGRAPHY EDUCATION

The Association of American Geographers (AAG) is submitting a proposal for the National Science Foundation to continue its support of the Center for Global Geography Education (CGGE), an online collection of geography resources for international collaborative learning. With funding from the National Science Foundation (2003-2005), the AAG embarked upon a pilot program to develop and test three Web-based course modules: Nationalism, Global Economy, and Population. The modules are used by students in different countries to investigate geographic issues

and share perspectives in a collaborative, online learning environment.

A major objective of the Phase 2 project will be developing a multi-year database for assessing the influence of international collaboration on student learning of geography content and attitudes toward world issues. In practical terms, the project will provide faculty with a "one-stop" resource for planning and implementing an international teaching collaboration.

CGGE fundamentally supports the AAG's programs to foster research and education collaborations internationally and will supply models of collaboration for new initiatives across Latin America, the Middle East, and other regions. Geography undergraduates will therefore gain opportunities to interact with students in countries engaged, often contentiously, with the United States over issues related to immigration, nationalism, environmental pollution, and economic globalization. The project design includes an extensive outreach and dissemination plan via partnerships with the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AAC&U), Grosvenor Center for Geographic Education, HERODOT Network, International Geographical Union (IGU), International Network for Learning and Teaching (INLT), National Council for Geographic Education (NCGE), and Pan American Institute for Geography and History.
